

Summary of GHSA Action Package Coordination Meeting Day 1, 23 August 2016

1. GHSA Action Package Coordination Meeting was convened in Jakarta from 23-25 August 2016 and was attended by lead and contributing countries of action packages and 3 permanent advisors (FAO, OIE, and WHO).
2. The Meeting was officially opened by H.E Prof. Dr. Nila F Moeloek, Minister of Health of the Republic of Indonesia. The Minister highlighted the importance of cooperation within the context of Global Health Security Agenda through Action Package implementation. It is therefore important to strengthen capacities of all GHSA participating countries in detecting, preventing, and responding to all global security threats. It is also important that implementation of each of the Action Package must be supported by all concerned stakeholders.
3. The first session of the meeting began with three speakers who gave an update on the progress of the GHSA Action Package. The Secretary General of the Ministry of Health of the Republic of Indonesia gave an introduction on the progress of the GHSA 2014-2016, followed by the representative of the Netherlands who given update on the preparation on the GHSA 3rd Annual Meeting at 12 – 14 October 2016 in Rotterdam. The representative of the USA spoke on the progress of the elements of the Action Package.
4. Three permanent advisors to GHSA, WHO, FAO, and OIE shared the progress of GHSA. WHO presented an update on the JEE and Strategic Partnership Portal (SPP) which can be used for internal self-assessment or external evaluation. FAO and OIE have worked closely together on animal health related issues engaging Ministries of Agriculture and veterinary services through the creation of the Performance Veterinary System (PVS).
5. In the first panel consisted of Antimicrobial Resistance Action Package and Immunization Action Package, two panelists, namely, the United Kingdom and Indonesia presented Prevent Action Package Report on 2015 regarding Antimicrobial Resistance and Immunization. The United Kingdom focused on priorities for 2016 which are action oriented such as : Research and Development, One Health, Surveillance and Stewardship. Indonesia shared its best practices to achieve National Vaccines Access and Delivery through EVM Assessment implementation with the latest EVMA showing in 2015 and Action Package Immunization Road Map for 5 years.
6. The second panel consisted of Zoonotic Diseases Action Package, Biosafety and Biosecurity Action Package, and presentation from Vietnam as a discussant country, it was emphasized the need to use PVS in harmony with JEE and other tools in line

with the targets stated in ZDAP Road Map. It was also suggested that One Health-driven Risk Mapping should be continued to help the program direction.

For Biosafety and Biosecurity Action Package, tools and training for the development, implementation, and maintenance of national biosafety and biosecurity frameworks and oversight system should be provided.

Vietnam suggested that activities should involve future planning at the National, Regional and International levels to fill in the gaps after both internal and external evaluation.

7. In the third panel presentations were on strengthening National Laboratory System by communication, coordination and cooperation through workshops, seminars, training and face to face information. Integrating surveillance into action packages also involves funding and good collaboration with donors such as WHO, FAO etc. Several gaps were identified such as information sharing and through the collaboration we can fulfill the gap. In addition, multipartnership has to show strong leadership.

For the Real Time Surveillance 'software', 'hardware' and 'brainware' must be organized to support a strong leadership as well as working together between public health and animal health sectors.

The Chair concluded the sessions on Day 1 and thanked all participants for the fruitful discussion.
